Upcoming Election

Nominations for the Flying Electrons Board of Directors will be open at the October 9th membership meeting. All current board members have agreed to run for their respective positions again, with the exception of our club Secretary/Treasurer, Pete Milewski.

In preparation for his departure, I asked Pete to put together an outline of his duties and responsibilities. In addition to his role as Secretary/Treasurer, Pete also assumed the responsibility of stocking and running the concession stand for many of our events. This includes, buying the food, soda, and supplies, as well as setting up the concession stand the day of the event.

While these aren't specifically duties of the club Secretary/Treasurer, they are important tasks that will need to be covered if we are to maintain the same level of service we've come to enjoy.

I learned many things from him, including the "ABC Rule" (Antenna/Battery/Control Surfaces) which I still recite before each flight. So, if you see me checking my battery and the direction control surfaces are moving before each flight, that's a little bit of Marv living on at our field.

Tamarack Challenge—by Joe Burzinski

The Flying Electrons hosted the 19th annual Tamarack Challenge pattern contest on September 17th and 18th. We had 17 registered pilots from five states, including three Flying Electrons club members. As with last year's contest, Saturday's weather proved to be very challenging, even for the most experienced flyers. The wind was out of the southwest and gusting to 20+ mph.

Sunday's weather was the complete opposite, with light winds straight down the runway. Conditions like that are great, but every mistake made is noticeable. Fortunately there were no mishaps and all planes made it home safely.

With the exception of the Intermediate class, which had one flyer, all classes were well represented. We had 4 pilots in Sportsman, including club members Steve Huelsbeck, and Patrick Hansen, 1 pilot in Intermediate, 3 pilots in Advanced, including club member Joe Burzinski, and 6 pilots in Masters. We were excited to have 3 pilots flying in our Club Class this year. Robin Barnett, the spouse of one of the Iowa pilots flew her nice E-flite Carbon-Z Splendor. Two other flyers from the Sheboygan area joined in with their 35% gassers, a Yak and an Extra. Yep, that's right... 35%'ers. It was quite a site to see those big planes going through the Club sequence.

As with previous years, we tried something a little different with awards. Instead of the usual 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place plaques that just gather dust on the shelf, we raffled off eight \$25 gift certificates from F3A Unlimited. Every registered

September aircraft: The Embraer EMB 314 Super Tucano, also named ALX or A-29 .

It is a turboprop aircraft designed for light attack, counter insurgency (COIN), close air support, aerial reconnaissance missions in low threat environments, as well as providing pilot training.

Designed to operate in high temperature and humidity conditions in extremely rugged terrain, the Super Tucano is highly maneuverable, has a low heat signature, incorporates fourth generation [avionics](#) and weapons system to deliver precision guided munitions.

Proposed Bylaw Changes

Outlined below are the proposed changes to the Flying Electrons Club Bylaws which give the board of directors the discretionary power to split the Secretary/Treasurer role into separate board positions. This will be discussed at the October club meeting and voted upon at our regular November club meeting. If you have any questions or would like to provide feedback prior to the meeting, please contact Pete Milewski at petkatmil@att.net .

ARTICLE III DUES AND ASSESSMENTS

Section 3.04. Payment of Dues

(- OLD -)

(b) The treasurer shall mail notice of dues to all members before October 15 of each year for dues payable for the membership year commencing on the next January 1. Publication of notice in the club newsletter shall constitute proper notice.

(- NEW -)

(b) The secretary shall mail notice of dues to all members before October 15 of each year for dues payable for the membership year commencing on the next January 1. Publication of notice in the club newsletter shall constitute proper notice.

(- OLD -)

(c) Membership cards shall not be issued by the treasurer to a member until the treasurer is satisfied that the conditions to membership have been satisfied.

(- NEW -)

(c) Membership cards shall not be issued by the secretary to a member until the secretary is satisfied that the conditions of membership have been satisfied and all applicable fees have been paid.

ARTICLE V BOARD OF DIRECTORS

(- OLD -)

Section 5.01. General Powers. The club's power shall be exercised by or under the authority of and its business and affairs shall be managed under the direction of its board of directors, except as may otherwise provided in these by-laws. The board of directors shall consist of 7 persons, the president, vice president and secretary/treasurer and four other members.

(- NEW -)

Section 5.01. General Powers. The club's power shall be exercised by or under the authority of and its business and affairs shall be managed under the direction of its board of directors, except as may otherwise provided in these by-laws. The board of directors shall consist of 7 persons, the president, vice president, secretary /treasurer and four other members. The position of secretary/treasurer may, at the discretion of the Board of Directors, may be split into two distinct positions, each acting as officers of the club. In this case, the board of directors will consist of 8 persons.

ARTICLE VI OFFICERS

Section 6.01. Officers.

(- OLD -)

The officers of the club shall be the president, vice president and secretary/treasurer.

(- NEW -)

The officers of the club shall be the president, vice president and secretary/treasurer. The position of secretary/treasurer may, at the discretion of the Board of Directors, may be split into two distinct positions, each acting as officers of the club.

Section 6.02. Duties of Officers.

(- OLD -)

(c) Secretary/Treasurer. The secretary/treasurer shall keep minutes of all meetings, conduct correspondence, take custody of all moneys and valuable papers and property of the club, and perform all other duties customary to such office.

(- NEW -)

(c) Secretary. The secretary shall record accurate minutes of all meetings; shall maintain the club's membership records, shall maintain the club's permanent records; and shall perform such other duties as pertain to this office or as may be assigned by the club president or the Board of Directors.

(d) Treasurer. The treasurer shall collect and disburse all monies of the club; shall prepare and adhere to an approved budget; shall maintain accurate records; shall transact business through a bank account; shall keep the Board of Directors informed of financial strengths and weaknesses of the club; shall order club supplies; shall have the books audited; shall file appropriate forms with the IRS if necessary; and shall perform such other duties as pertains to this office or as may be assigned by the club president or the Board of Directors.

Tips and Tricks Prelude to a Helicopter - by Pete Smith

Years back conventional wisdom for learning how to fly helicopters was to get an “outside” one, strap on training gear, (in the form of dowel rods) and burn fuel (now batteries).

It was an expensive proposition and lots of people didn’t want to spend the money or just ended up getting frustrated and selling the gear on eBay or Craig’s List. Others suggested Flight Simulators, but they are pricey as well.

A recent magazine article provided a novel approach. They recommended getting an inexpensive quadcopter and after several flights seeing if there was still interest in pursuing helicopters!

The Blade Inductrix is an example of one to use. For \$69, \$49 Bind and Fly, it is small, easy to fly, and has protection around the blades. It is perfect for indoor use, or outside if no wind or breeze.


Using the quadcopter is a great way to learn hovering both “tail in” and “nose in”, boxes, circles, and figure eights. Once proficient the aspiring pilot could graduate to a micro or larger helicopter, and would be able to quickly transfer what they learned from quadcopters to helicopters. :}



Is this the first plane that will fly on Mars?

Prototype of NASA aircraft completes its first test flight Named Prandtl-M, the aircraft will be small and piloted remotely. It’s been designed by NASA engineers along with two groups of students. Prototype flew on 11 August at the Armstrong Flight Research Centre. It could one day fly in Mars' atmosphere and return samples to Earth!

Envisioned with a wingspan of two feet and weighing less than three pounds, the aircraft would be able to deploy, fly in the Martian atmosphere, glide down and land. During its flight over Mars could, the plane would collect very detailed high-resolution topographic images.





Hobby / Recreational Flying

What Can I Do With My Model Aircraft?

Having fun means flying safely! Hobby or recreational flying doesn't require FAA approval but you must follow safety guidelines. Any other use requires FAA authorization.

AVOID DOING ANYTHING HAZARDOUS TO OTHER AIRPLANES OR PEOPLE AND PROPERTY ON THE GROUND

- ✔ **DO** fly a model aircraft/UAS at the local model aircraft club
- ✔ **DO** take lessons and learn to fly safely
- ✔ **DO** contact the airport or control tower when flying within 5 miles of the airport
- ✔ **DO** fly a model aircraft for personal enjoyment
- ❌ **DON'T** fly near manned aircraft
- ❌ **DON'T** fly beyond line of sight of the operator
- ❌ **DON'T** fly an aircraft weighing more than 55 lbs unless it's certified by an aeromodelling community-based organization
- ❌ **DON'T** fly contrary to your aeromodelling community-based safety guidelines
- ❌ **DON'T** fly model aircraft for payment or commercial purposes
